Keynote: “From development trap to dynamic balance: achieving a global wellbeing economy”



CAROLINE WHYTE

Caroline Whyte is an ecological economist at Feasta, the Foundation for the Economics of Sustainability. The word 'Feasta' means 'henceforth' or 'in the future' in Irish. Feasta focuses on identifying and advocating systemic-level changes in the economy that can help to reorient it away from extractivism and expansionism and towards human and ecological wellbeing. While some of Feasta's activity focusses on Ireland, it also engages in European, North American and global-level research and advocacy.

Caroline is the lead author of multiple Feasta submissions to Irish and EU governmental bodies on policy ranging from climate, biodiversity protection and agriculture to taxation and welfare, enterprise, risk management and banking. Publications by Caroline in 2022 also include the papers “Phasing Out Fossil Fuels, Supporting Climate Justice”, and “Land, Labour, Housing, Money, Farms: moving the economic goalposts of Irish agriculture”. She has given presentations on both of these in recent months.

Caroline sits on the Steering Committees of the Environmental Pillar and Stop Climate Chaos Ireland, and she is one of three Environmental Pillar members of the Irish National Economic and Social Council (NESC). With her colleague Seán Ó Conláin she co-hosts a successful podcast series, 'Bridging the Gaps', for Feasta and the European Health Futures Forum. She is a core member of the Wellbeing Economy Hub for Ireland. The Hub's objectives include inspiring 'wellbeing economy' narratives in support of local and global responsibility for re-embedding our lives, livelihoods and systems within the space defined by the 'planetary boundaries'.

On the European level, Caroline represents Feasta in the Economic Transition Working Group of the European Environmental Bureau. She is also a Partner of the rural resilience coalition ARC2020, and a WEAll Ireland Hub representative in the EU Wellbeing Economy Coalition.

Along with four other Feasta climate group members, Caroline helped to launch the CapGlobalCarbon initiative at the COP-21 climate summit in Paris in December 2015. She is helping to coordinate Feasta's representation at the COP-27, which will include a group of youth delegates from the Global South. She wrote the conclusion for Feasta's book *Fleeing Vesuvius* Overcoming the risks of economic and environmental collapse, and contributed a chapter to *Sharing for Survival: restoring the climate, the commons and society*. She also gave a WEAll Talk in May 2022 on the climate as a commons.

Ndagire Florence is an international Disability Rights & Inclusion consultant with over 12 years' experience managing human rights and advocacy programs/project portfolios focused on gender equality, disability inclusion, women and youth's economic empowerment in Uganda. Florence is a Committee Member, UN Women; Member of the Open Society disability rights and inclusive education association; Advisor to UNPRDP; Committee Member/Legal Advisor, Uganda National Association of the Blind and Open Society Foundation Disability Rights Scholar.



Peadar Kirby is Professor Emeritus of International Politics and Public Policy, University of Limerick and a visiting professor at the Universidad de Valencia, Spain. He has lived in Cloughjordan Ecovillage since 2009 where he served on the board of directors from 2015-19 and is currently coordinator of the education programme. His latest books are Karl Polanyi and the Contemporary Global Crisis: Transforming Market Society in the Era of Climate Change, Foreword by President Michael D. Higgins (Bloomsbury, 2021) and, co-authored with Tadhg O'Mahony, The Political Economy of the Low-Carbon Transition: Pathways Beyond Techno-optimism (Palgrave Macmillan, 2018). He is currently writing a book entitled Athrú Treo: An Ghaeilge sa Trasnú go Sochaí Iar-Charbóin.



Judith Randel Judith Randel is Co-Director of Ideas and Action for Public Good which aims to deliver research, consultancy and engagement on poverty, inequality and the SDGs. She was the Co-Founder and Director of Development Initiatives, an independent organisation set up to use data and information to end poverty. Judith's particular focus was on financing for development, data, transparency and the people who are left behind. All her work is done together with DI co-founder, Tony German and includes the Reality of Aid reports from 1992 - 2000, the Global Humanitarian Assistance Reports from 2000, Investments to End Poverty 2013 to date and the data used to monitor G8 commitments. For the last two years Judith and Tony have been working on The P20 Initiative: Data to leave no one behind.

Hans Zomer is CEO of Global Action Plan Ireland, an environmental organisation focused on behaviour change. Prior to his appointment as CEO at Global Action Plan, Hans Zomer served as Head of Communications and Information at the Office of the President of Ireland, providing advice to the President and leading all public communications of the Office. Hans has two decades of management experience and a track record of increasing the reach and impact of organisations in the non-profit sector, driving change management processes and leading strategic reorientation operations in NGOs working in Ireland, Chad and Pakistan. He has served as Director of Dóchas, where he introduced two mandatory sector-wide codes of conduct and a series of guidelines for member organisations; the Dóchas Code of Corporate Governance that he initiated was the first such resource in Ireland's not-for-profit sector.

As the spokesperson of the international solidarity sector, Hans represented Irish NGOs nationally and internationally, including in the Oireachtas, in Brussels and at UN conferences. He initiated and chaired the "Make Poverty History" campaign, chaired the innovative "World's Best News" initiative and represented Irish NGOs in high-level campaigning leading up to the articulation of the UN Sustainable Development Goals in 2015. Hans is a member of the Public Relations Institute of Ireland, and a former member of the NGO Human Rights Committee of the Department of Foreign Affairs & Trade and of the International Advisory Group of Dublin City Council.

Theme: Critical Perspectives on Sustainable Development

In the context of unfolding climate breakdown, with the socio-political implications becoming more apparent, it seems appropriate to re-examine once again the concept of 'sustainable development'. Although the concept clearly is a central value in the United Nations sustainable development goals and many countries' policy frameworks, the claim underlying the concept has been subject to critical analysis for some time. It appears that today more radical and challenging alternatives to the very possibility of any 'development' being globally sustainable have arisen. At the core of this is concern that development itself, as currently modelled, cannot in principle be sustainable unless managed economic growth in the Southern world is accompanied by significant economic de-growth in the Western world.

This position though is fraught with challenges.

- How is any 'equilibrium' between Southern growth and Western de-growth to be identified and measured?
- How is 'de-growth' to be sold to Western publics who naturally perceive such a move as offering reductions in their material living standards?
- Is any growth currently justifiable anywhere?
- Might ecological concerns outweigh social justice or even principles of equality?
- How can we expect nations in the South to take these concerns into account when poverty and youth unemployment destabilises many low income countries (LICs) and economic development appears to be the only solution to offer LICs' citizens opportunities to meet their basic needs.



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An additional challenge to sustainable development arises from the emerging environmental imperative for human withdrawal from the natural world. The demands here are often fashioned as ‘re-wilding’ or regeneration. In any event, Western historical models of ‘development’ appear particularly ill-suited to contemporary requirements.

How truly sustainable is ‘sustainable development’ if it is predicated on further extraction of resources and the expansion of a growth-led consumer economy, however modest this may purport to be? The ‘Green economy’ itself requires vast resources to be implemented.

The DSAI Annual Conference 2022 seeks to address these various questions.

The objective is to rigorously interrogate the concept to examine its viability and adaptability to the emerging 21st century climate and habitat crises, with its attendant human displacement consequences.

The invitation is to think our way into addressing this challenge so that we may engage with initiatives and collective responses that contributors judge offer hope or potential in responding to these complex issues.
