Women's vulnerability to HIV: Infection




	Globally	In Sub-Saharan Africa
Women as a proportion of people living with HIV	50%	59%
Women as a proportion of 15-24 year olds living with HIV	60%	72%



Women's vulnerability to HIV: Impact



- Care
- Violence
- Barriers to accessing prevention, treatment, care and response
- Economic dependency: abandonment, disinheritance, poverty.







Methodology



- Desk review of international and national policy frameworks
- 21 partner questionnaires in 5 countries
- In-depth interviews with one representative from each country

- 1. Promote effective implementation of existing policies from national to local levels
- 1. Include women living with HIV in the decision making.

1. Tackle underlying social norms that drive gender inequality

- Power imbalances lead to specific barriers
- Twin epidemics of GBV and HIV – common driver
- Link Gender & HIV
 policies





2. Promote effective implementation of existing policies

- "The HIV strategy lacks leadership and the gender strategy lacks funding" – partner, Honduras
- Local government structures
- Funding. Impact of budget cuts



3. Include Women living with HIV in the Decision Making



Need to address barriers to women's participation

"I'm a woman, I'm black, I'm HIV positive, and I am going to make a difference." – Benita, Honduras

- Promote a more holistic, context-specific response to HIV;
- Recognise and overcome barriers to women's participation;
- Improve the coherence between HIV & gender policies, and resource both adequately;
- Link GBV & HIV responses beyond response to prevent transmission to prevention of violence;
- Tackle stigma and discrimination.



Recommendations: Practice



- Demonstrate political will to implement good policy frameworks and ensure accountability mechanisms are in place;
- Strengthen capacity of women's organisations;
- Build government capacity, especially at local level;
- Mobilise funds! Track commitments to gender equality and structural drivers of HIV within the response;
- Support development partners such as UNAIDS and the Global Fund.
